Community Business Meeting: This is a chance to connect, collaborate, and plan for the future of our group.


St. Valentine's Day Celebration: Let's celebrate St. Valentine as a family! Join us for a potluck and card exchange, plus fun activities for the kids.

Spring Into Homesteading: Tips, Tricks, and Seeds for Success





There is nothing simpler, nor more beautiful, than a kitchen garden. It is not enough to cultivate vegetables with care. You have the duty to arrange them according to their colors, and to frame them with flowers, so they appear like a well laid table."— St. Ignatius

A well-laid out garden, or, if you're very fortunate, a homestead, is a reflection of God's plan for His creation. It nurtures and sustains our families and allows us to remain focused on what really matters. There are few pasttimes as pleasurable in such a short timeframe. We raise our children, but certainly know from experience that it can take years to see the fruit of our labor when it comes to habits, physical nourishment, and education.

Not so with gardening! A little effort, a little water and love, and you can feed your family the fruit of your labors within mere weeks. As St. Ignatius points out, framing your gardens with particular beauty is our duty. Certainly he means more than flowers themselves; but rather the surrounding of the gardening tasks and gardening chores with the impression of gratefulness and happiness. Our families, and especially our children, are drawn to the things that we frame as lovely. Creation of beauty among nourishment is satisfying to our souls who yearn for the beauty of Heaven.

Our family is self-taught homesteaders who began with potted tomatoes and illegal HOA chickens and have worked our way up to more animals than is probably wise. We have a full cemetery. Our garden fails more than it thrives. I am certain we do not actually save any money.

Tips for Starting a Spring Garden

East Texas Growing Guide

for popular plants

Direct Sow

Crop	Spring Planting Date	Distance to plant apart	Days until harvest
Carrots	Feb. 20	2"	21
Lettuce	March 1	2-3"	21
Radishes	March 1	1"	7
Squash	March 1-15	18-36"	40
Potatoes	Feb. 1-15	10-15"	When tops start browning



Seeds to Start

Сгор	Spring Planting Date back this up 2 months-ish for seed starting	Distance to plant apart	Days until harvest
Watermelon	March 15	36-96"	90
Tomatoes	March 1-15	18-36"	40
Peppers	April 1	18-24"	90

Tip: Many plants that thrive in Northeast Texas as direct sow can also be started as seed, and vice versa. If you have an appropriate space to start seeds, they can give you a jump start to harvest, and you can always direct sow your next set. When attempting to feed a family from a garden, it is always wise to continuously plant in order to ensure a full season of harvest. Planting from quality seed will always be more cost effective (and better quality) than using most store-bought starts.

Homestead Success Stories and Lessons Learned

Space Constraints and Homesteading

With proper stewardship, even small acreage properties can grow some of their own meat! Joel Salatin with <u>Polyface Farms</u> is a premier source of information on animal rotation to maximize pasture health, and he recently accepted a role as an advisor to the White House! Electric fencing such as that found at <u>Premier 1</u> can allow for expanded use of limited acreage at a fraction of the cost! Bonus: the batteries for solar chargers are the same as kids' battery car toys, so you can have multiple on hand at any moment for your crazy animal.... and actual animal... demands.



Children's Chore: Collect Eggs!

Eggs not collected can yield unpleasant surprises! It is wise to crack the egg into a separate dish to ensure it is usable before adding it to batter, etc. Clean-appearing eggs typically last 2 to 3 months on the counter due to their helpful and protective "bloom", while super dirty eggs needing washing should be refrigerated after their scrub.





Hatching your own eggs

The process of hatching your own eggs can be exceptionally educational for children. Did you know you can watch the developmental process of the baby chick through a special light on a basic incubator? If you want to experience this for your own family, without the commitment to the fluffy butts that emerge, notify the group and secure a farm home in advance. Many of us are also happy to provide fertilized eggs for your Springtime science lessons!



It isn't all about the producers! Special shout-out to the barn cats and Livestock Guardian Dogs who keep our farms safe to raise foods of all sorts. If you are in the market for the canine-kind, look no further than the Jodoin Pyr-Poodle-Shepherd pups and be sure to shop Catholic/local whenever possible!

Favorite plants or vegetables to grow with kids

Jodoin Family

Fowl are a wonderful low effort and low cost way to encourage self-sufficiency. The daily chores are not difficult and are easily done by a middle school child. This allows our children to develop responsibility, a love for animals, an appreciation for farmers and sometimes the real idea of the circle of life. Once we moved south, we chose Ridley bronze & sweetgrass turkeys to raise. Ridley Bronze was a turkey breed developed in Western Canada and had less than 1500 breeding pairs. Sweetgrass is a Montana developed breed. Our egglaying chicken preference is the English Standard Orpington, a quality dual purpose bird.



Turner Family

Setting sprinklers on an every-other-day morning watering (45 minutes) completely changed our quality of harvest this summer. Consistency of watering was key to a productive garden- with no extra work on our part! Huge lesson learned, and gratefully, as we have enough to do on the day-to-day!



Lockman Family

We planted garlic this past November and it looks promising to be ready by this Spring. We ordered Softneck bulbs, broke each bulb into cloves and planted each clove. Each clove should yield its own bulb! We planted in the sunniest part of our garden and covered the soil with leaves to prevent freezing during the winter. They have begun to sprout and hoping they turn out great for the Spring! This is my first time doing this and I do not have a green thumb so if I can do it, anyone can!



Lopez Family

Getting started in cattle can be very intimidating! These animals are much larger than their smaller farmstead counterparts and they have much higher feed needs. But, a single bovine processed can yield up to 6 months of meat for a family of 6. One dairy cow that is sharing milk between calf and container (looking at you, Ranger!) can still fill four children's bellies. The challenges of large animal farming are more than outweighed by the benefits.

February 2nd: Candlemas/Presentation of the Lord:


- Attend Mass

- Plan a family day/family outing


February 14: St. Valentine's Day Catholics celebrate the Feast of Saint Valentine, also known as Valentine's Day
